rust is easy when you know the plan and the outcome. But, then again, that's not really trust. Trust is needed when there is a lot you don't know. Consider the times of your affliction. We grumble under them because suddenly we imagine that what God had promised is no longer true. We measure the word which God has spoken by our experience of the world around us. And when what we experience appears contrary to God's word, we begin to assume that God's word and therefore God Himself is not trustworthy. Certainly, when the patriarch Abraham was commanded by God to sacrifice his son Isaac, the son through whom the Savior would come, Abraham's flesh cried out that God could not be trusted. "He has said two things that cannot both be true - from Isaac will come the Savior and Isaac must die without children!" When we are plagued by temptation to a particular sin and pray to God to remove the temptation and He doesn't, we begin to image that God is unfaithful and actually leading us into temptation. These are the moments when trust is most necessary - when we can't understand the methods of God. In these times when we are most tempted to rely on our own ability to rationalize and understand things that aren't clear to us - these are the times when we must humble ourselves under the mighty and merciful hand of God and rest in the truth that the promises of God will endure and will be carried out even when we don't understand how. It's okay that we don't understand. We know Jesus. We know what God has promised. These are unchanging. These are the times when, like father Abraham, we have to suspend our understanding and believe that God is able to do far more than we are able to even think. If to keep His promise He has to raise someone from the dead, He can and He will. May Christ forgive us for ever doubting the words and promises of God and may we, by the power of the Holy Spirit, trust wholly and completely in the God who didn't spare His own Son but offered Him up for us all that we might be saved.
