FAITH IN THE WORD

For the week of The First Sunday in Advent December 1 – December 6, AD 2024

hen we pray "forgive us our trespasses" we are making a confession. We are saying to our Heavenly Father that we have sinned against Him in thought, word, and deed, by what we have done and by what we have left undone. It is a full confession that leaves nothing out. We are confessing the sins we are aware of and the ones we are not. It is certainly true that no one can know all his sins. But it is less troubling to not know all your sins than to hide under the delusion that you don't know any of your sins. To either pretend that or to willingly not examine yourself is very dangerous. Doing so falsely quiets your conscience so that you begin to imagine that you really don't need grace. But you are only whitewashing over your sin and denying yourself the rich forgiveness which Christ has purchased for you. Failing to examine your life in light of the Ten Commandments also allows the devil to continue to mislead you into all kinds of sin. The one who prays this petition truly is keenly aware of his own sin and so readily knows that his sins are far greater in both number and magnitude than he can even begin to imagine. It is that confession that is pleasing to God because it doesn't try to hide or withhold anything but freely confesses everything it knows and doesn't know. Such a prayer is driven by the magnitude of God's mercy which He has shown to us through the death and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ who left no sin unpaid for by His Blood. God grant that we meditate daily on His commandments and so rightly rejoice in the magnitude of His mercy in Jesus.

The Catechism

As the head of the family should teach it in a simple way to the household. Pray and confess out loud as much from the order of meditation and prayer as you are able, or as your family size and ages dictate. Learn by heart the verse, catechism, and hymn of the week.

The Lord's Prayer – The Fifth Petition

And forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us.

What does this mean? We pray in this petition that our Father in heaven would not look at our sins, or deny our prayer because of them. We are neither worthy of the things for which we pray, nor have we deserved them, but we ask that He would give them all to us by grace, for we daily sin much and surely deserve nothing but punishment. So we too will sincerely forgive and gladly do good to those who sin against us
